

FAMILY GUIDE

What is the CSA?

The Children's Services Act (CSA) provides multi-disciplinary planning and funding to help meet the needs of children and families in Virginia. CSA prioritizes services that are child-centered, family-focused, and community-based.

Who is eligible?

Children who are facing significant behavioral or mental health challenges in their home, school, or community may qualify for CSA. This includes children who are being served through child-serving agencies such as Social Services, Court Service Unit, Local School Division, and/or Community Services Board.

Contact your local CSA Coordinator to determine whether your child may be eligible for CSA funding.



To be eligible, your child must meet one or more of these criterion:

- ✓ Has emotional or behavioral problems that occur over a long period and requires intervention;
- ✓ Is at risk for a residential placement due to serious behavior or emotional problems;
- ✓ Is in a private special education placement; and/or
- ✓ Is receiving foster care services, including services to prevent a foster care placement.

The Local CSA

Within the local CSA program, there are two teams that bring their professional knowledge and experience in support of families: the Family Assessment and Planning Team (FAPT) and the Community Policy and Management Team (CPMT).



FAPT works directly with families, and refers families to service providers, provides funding, and closely monitors services to ensure families' needs are being met.

FAPT members come from local agencies that work with children, and includes a Parent Representative - a parent, like you - who has experience with child-serving systems.

The most important team member is **YOU!** Your knowledge and insight help FAPT decide which services and supports they will recommend.



The CPMT is the other local team and has similar membership to the FAPT. CPMT develops local CSA policies and manages the funds used to purchase services. CPMT has oversight of FAPT's service recommendations and must approve the use of CSA funds..
